ORDER

On this day the Texas Board of Nursing, hereinafter referred to as the Board, considered the matter of HEATHER ELIZABETH BEMROSE, Registered Nurse License Number 732767, hereinafter referred to as Respondent.

Information received by the Board produced evidence that Respondent may have violated Section 301.452(b)(10)&(13), Texas Occupations Code. Respondent waived representation by counsel, informal proceedings, notice and hearing, and agreed to the entry of this Order offered on June 7, 2011, by Katherine A. Thomas, MN, RN, Executive Director.

FINDINGS OF FACT

- 1. Prior to the institution of Agency proceedings, notice of the matters specified below in these Findings of Fact was served on Respondent and Respondent was given an opportunity to show compliance with all requirements of the law for retention of the license(s).
- 2. Respondent waived representation by counsel, informal proceedings, notice and hearing, and agreed to the entry of this Order.
- 3. Respondent is currently licensed to practice professional nursing in the State of Texas.
- 4. Respondent received an Associate Degree in Nursing from Galveston College, Galveston, Texas, on May 18, 2006. Respondent was licensed to practice professional nursing in the State of Texas on August 15, 2006.

- 6. At the time of the initial incident, Respondent was employed as a registered nurse with Memorial Hermann Texas Medical Center, Houston, Texas, and had been in this position for one (1) year.
- 7. On or about July 3, 2007 through July 21, 2007, while employed as a Registered Nurse with Memorial Hermann Texas Medical Center, Houston, Texas, Respondent withdrew Hydrocodone, Hydromorphone, and Diazepam from the Medication Dispensing System for patients in excess frequency and/or dosage from the physician's order, as follows:

Respondent's conduct was likely to injure the patient in that the administration of Hydrocodone, Hydromorphone, and Diazepam in excess frequency and/or dosage of the physician's order could result in the patient suffering from adverse reactions and is in violation of Chapter 481 (Controlled Substances Act) of the Texas Health and Safety Code.

8. On or about July 1, 2007 through July 21, 2007, while employed as a Registered Nurse with Memorial Hermann Texas Medical Center, Houston, Texas, Respondent withdrew Hydrocodone, Hydromorphone, and Morphine from the Medication Dispensing System for patients, but failed to completely and accurately document the administration of the medication in the patient's Medication Administration Record and/or Nurse's Notes, as follows:

Respondent's conduct above was likely to injure the patients in that subsequent care givers would rely on her documentation to further medicate the patient which could result in an overdose.

9. On or about July 1, 2007 through July 21, 2007, while employed as a Registered Nurse with Memorial Hermann Texas Medical Center, Houston, Texas, Respondent withdrew Hydrocodone, Hydromorphone, Morphine, and Diazepam from the Medication Dispensing System for patients, but failed to follow the policy and procedure for wastage of the medications, as follows:

- Respondent's conduct was likely to deceive the hospital pharmacy and placed them in violation of Chapter 481 of the Texas Health and Safety Code (Controlled Substances Act).
- 10. On or about July 7, 2007 through July 21, 2007, while employed as a Registered Nurse with Memorial Hermann Texas Medical Center, Houston, Texas, Respondent withdrew Hydrocodone and Fentanyl from the Medication Dispensing System for patients, but failed to administer them in a timely manner, as follows:

Respondent's conduct was likely to injure the patient in that failure to administer medications as ordered by the physician could have resulted in nonefficacious treatment.

- 11. On or about July 13, 2007, while employed as a Registered Nurse with Memorial Hermann Texas Medical Center, Houston, Texas, Respondent failed to administer Lortab Elixir to Patient Medical Record Number 7177, as ordered by the physician, in that it was to be given every six (6) hours. Respondent did not administer the 0845 dose until 1000, therefore the next does would be due at 14:00; Respondent did not administer it until 17:12. Respondent's conduct was likely to injure the patient in that failure to administer medications as ordered by the physician could have resulted in nonefficacious treatment.
- 12. On or about July 21, 2007, while employed as a Registered Nurse with Memorial Hermann Texas Medical Center, Houston, Texas, Respondent falsely documented in the Medication Administration Record of Patient Medical Record Number 7-9367, the administration of Diazepam approximately two (2) hours prior to withdrawing the medication. Respondent's conduct exposed the patient unnecessarily to a risk of harm in that it resulted in an inaccurate medical record and was likely to deceive subsequent care givers who relied on the accuracy of the information while providing care to the patient.
- 13. On or about July 1, 2007 through July 21, 2007, while employed as a Registered Nurse with Memorial Hermann Texas Medical Center, Houston, Texas, Respondent misappropriated Hydrocodone, Hydromorphone, Morphine, and Diazepam belonging to the facility and patients thereof, or failed to take precautions to prevent such misappropriation. Respondent's conduct was likely to defraud the facility and patients of the cost of the medications and is in violation of Chapter 481 of the Texas Health and Safety Code (Controlled Substances Act).

- 14. On or about October 13, 2010, Respondent entered a plea of Nolo Contendere and was convicted of the reduced offense of CRIMINAL TRESPASS, (a Misdemeanor offense committed on January 19, 2010), in the County Court at Law No. 3 of Galveston County, Texas, under Cause No. 300932. As a result of the conviction, Respondent was confined to the County Jail until she paid a fine and court costs.
- 15. On or about May 20, 2011 to May 30, 2011, while employed with Texas Specialty Hospital, Houston, Texas, Respondent withdrew Hydromorphone and Lorazepam from the medication dispensing system for patients in excess frequency and/or dosage of the physician's order. Respondent's conduct was likely to injure the patients in that the administration of Hydromorphone and Lorazepam in excess frequency and/or dosage of the physician's order could result in the patients suffering from adverse reactions and is in violation of Chapter 481 (Controlled Substances Act) of the Texas Health and Safety Code.
- 16. On or about May 20, 2011 to May 30, 2011, while employed with Texas Specialty Hospital, Houston, Texas, Respondent withdrew Hydromorphone and Lorazepam from the medication dispensing system for patients, but failed to accurately and/or completely document the administration in the patients' medication administration records (MARs) and/or nurse's notes. Respondent's conduct was likely to injure the patients in that subsequent care givers would rely on her documentation to further medicate the patient which could result in an overdose.
- 17. On or about May 20, 2011 to May 30, 2011, while employed with Texas Specialty Hospital, Houston, Texas, Respondent withdrew Hydromorphone and Lorazepam from the medication dispensing system for patients, but failed to follow the facility's policy and procedure for wastage of the unused portions of the medications. Respondent's conduct was likely to deceive the hospital pharmacy and placed them in violation of Chapter 481 of the Texas Health and Safety Code (Controlled Substances Act).
- 18. On or about May 20, 2011 to May 30, 2011, while employed with Texas Specialty Hospital, Houston, Texas, Respondent misappropriated, or failed to take precautions to prevent such misappropriation of, Hydromorphone and Lorazepam from the facility and patients thereof. Respondent's conduct was likely to defraud the facility and patients of the cost of the medications and is in violation of Chapter 481 of the Texas Health and Safety Code (Controlled Substances Act).
- 19. The Respondent's conduct described in the preceding Findings of Fact was reportable under the provisions of Sections 301.401-301.419, Texas Occupations Code.
- 20. The Board finds that there exists serious risks to public health and safety as a result of impaired nursing care due to intemperate use of controlled substances or chemical dependency.

- 21. On or about September 16, 2009, Respondent underwent a forensic psychological evaluation with Alexander Howe, PhD, wherein Dr. Howe advised the following:
 - "From a psychological perspective, [Respondent] does present with a notable Dysthymic Disorder, accompanying health issues, longstanding primary family and marital issues, as well as a personality approach that may continue to limit her effectiveness in resolving current and probably future personal and interpersonal conflicts in her life. It would be beneficial for [Respondent] to seek out, obtain, and maintain a relationship with a trained mental health provider who could review with her the significant events in her life and assist [Respondent] in developing a perspective or approach that would offer her a greater sense of skill in insuring that both her personal, interpersonal, and vocational needs are met."
- 22. Formal Charges were filed on July 15, 2009.
- 23. Formal Charges were mailed to Respondent on July 22, 2009.
- 24. Respondent's conduct described in Finding of Fact Numbers Seven (7) to Eighteen (18) resulted from Respondent's dependency on chemicals and mental illness.
- 25. Respondent's compliance with the terms of a Board approved peer assistance program should be sufficient to protect patients and the public.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

- 1. Pursuant to Texas Occupations Code, Sections 301.451-301.455, the Board has jurisdiction over this matter.
- 2. Notice was served in accordance with law.
- 3. The evidence received is sufficient to prove violations of Section 301.452(b)(10)&(13), Texas Occupations Code, and 22 TEX. ADMIN. CODE §§217.11(1)(A),(B),(C)&(D) and 217.12(1)(A),(1)(B),(1)(C),(4),(6)(A),(6)(G),(8),(10)(B),(10)(C)&(11)(B).
- 4. The evidence received is sufficient cause pursuant to Section 301.452(b), Texas Occupations Code, to take disciplinary action against Registered Nurse License Number 732767, heretofore issued to HEATHER ELIZABETH BEMROSE, including revocation of Respondent's license(s) to practice nursing in the State of Texas.
- 5. The Board may, in its discretion, order a nurse to participate in a peer assistance program approved by the Board if the nurse would otherwise have been eligible for referral to peer assistance pursuant to Section 301.410, Texas Occupations Code.

ORDER

IT IS THEREFORE AGREED and ORDERED that RESPONDENT, in lieu of the sanction of Revocation under Section 301.453, Texas Occupations Code, SHALL comply with the following conditions for such a time as is required for RESPONDENT to successfully complete the Texas Peer Assistance Program for Nurses (TPAPN):

- (1) RESPONDENT SHALL, within forty-five (45) days following the date of entry of this final Order, apply to TPAPN and SHALL, within ninety (90) days following the date of entry of this final Order, sign and execute the TPAPN participation agreement, which SHALL include payment of a non-refundable participation fee in the amount of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) payable to TPAPN.
- (2) Upon acceptance into the TPAPN, RESPONDENT SHALL waive confidentiality and provide a copy of the executed TPAPN participation agreement to the Texas Board of Nursing.
- (3) RESPONDENT SHALL comply with all requirements of the TPAPN participation agreement during its term and SHALL keep her license(s) to practice nursing in the State of Texas current.
- (4) RESPONDENT SHALL CAUSE the TPAPN to notify the Texas Board of Nursing of any violation of the TPAPN participation agreement.

IT IS FURTHER AGREED and ORDERED, RESPONDENT SHALL comply in all respects with the Nursing Practice Act, Texas Occupations Code, Section §§301.001 et seq., the Rules and Regulations Relating to Nurse Education, Licensure and Practice, 22 TEX. ADMIN. CODE §211.1 et seq. and this Order.

IT IS FURTHER AGREED and ORDERED that this Order SHALL be applicable to Respondent's nurse licensure compact privileges, if any, to practice nursing in the State of Texas.

IT IS FURTHER AGREED and ORDERED that while Respondent's license(s) is/are encumbered by this Order, Respondent may not work outside the State of Texas pursuant to a multistate licensure privilege without the written permission of the Texas Board of Nursing and the Board of Nursing in the party state where Respondent wishes to work.

IT IS FURTHER AGREED, SHOULD RESPONDENT fail to comply with this Order or the terms of the participation agreement with the TPAPN, such noncompliance will result in further disciplinary action including EMERGENCY SUSPENSION pursuant to Section 301.4551, Texas Occupations Code, or REVOCATION of Respondent's license(s) and nurse licensure compact privileges, if any, to practice nursing in the State of Texas.


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RESPONDENT'S CERTIFICATION
